A TRADITION OF CARING

When the Sisters of Providence arrived in the Pacific Northwest in 1856, they came to answer a call for help from a new pioneer community. What they found were many communities in need of service, and so with dedication and collaboration, they built the first schools, hospitals and orphanages in the West. Their ministry grew to what is now a five-state health system. We continue the tradition of caring that the sisters began nearly 160 years ago, always keeping in mind the most poor and vulnerable.

Our Mission: As people of Providence, we reveal God's love for all, especially the poor and vulnerable, through our compassionate service.

WHERE WE SERVE

Providence Health & Services in Alaska is the state's leading health care provider, operating five hospitals, including a Level II trauma center, the only children's hospital and Level III newborn intensive care unit, nearly 30 clinics and a network of diverse community services. With more than 4,000 caregivers (all employees), Providence is the state's largest private employer.

Providence in Alaska is part of the third largest not-for-profit health system in the nation which also serves communities in Oregon, Montana, Washington and California. Our combined scope of services include 34 hospitals, 475 physician clinics, long-term and assisted living, palliative and hospice care, home health, supportive housing and education. In 2014, Providence provided a total of \$848 million in community benefit.
